CANADIAN PATH

Youth-led

A solid Canadian Path troop experience has Scouts actively engaged and leading the preparation, delivery and review of their adventures.

Your Jamboree Planning Team is working on a framework which will help YOU determine the focus for your Jamboree adventure. You and your fellow patrol members will collaborate in to plan and deliver the program day-to-day. You set the course of the day/week.

Make sure each member of your patrol gets the opportunity to take on a leadership role during the Jamboree. Your Scouters and the Jamboree staff and volunteers will be able to help facilitate the great, safe adventures you plan and execute.

Plan-Do-Review

You will plan, do and then review the activities of your choice. Of course, actually doing the activities is when you will have the most fun. Reviewing should not wait until the end of the Jamboree or the end of the day. Your Scouters and the Jamboree staff will help you review your activities at key opportunities every day. A review can

be done while waiting for lunch, hiking out to the beach or enjoying a campfire. Even free time can be reviewed. What did you do? What did you learn? How can you improve your next free time?

In preparing for the Jamboree, don't forget to incorporate the SPICES into the reviews (see video at <https://youtu.be/iaUCeNAsN-o>).

ACCEPTING THE CHALLENGE

The Jamboree will be held at Camp Nedooae, in Nova Scotia from Saturday 8 July 2017 through until Saturday 15 July 2017. Patrols will be permitted on site starting Friday 7 July. If you plan on arriving earlier than that, we will assist you in making arrangements to camp elsewhere until Camp Nedooae opens at 1:00 pm on 7 July.

Use your arrival day to set up your camp site, dining tarps, kitchen area and cooking stoves. You'll be living and sleeping on this site for 8 days, so do everything you can to make it as comfortable as possible. Once you've done that, have a look around Camp Nedooae and get an idea of the exciting places you'll be visiting. Explore and learn where the grocery stores, showers and toilets are located. Have a look at your subcamp headquarters and get to know the folks who will be helping you all week. Check out the Services Centre and see what's happening there. St. Andrew's Plaza will be open at noon, so be sure to check that out.

ORGANIZING YOUR TEAM

The basic unit of organization for the Jamboree will be a Patrol. Patrols will be made up of a maximum of eight scouts and two or three Scouters. Patrols that register with less than eight scouts are expected to welcome other scouts into the patrol in order to ensure that all scouts can enjoy the Jamboree experience. Where there are 8 youth in the patrol, patrols may bring a third registered Scouter to enable better distribution of scouter's responsibilities.

In a Patrol, every Scout has the opportunity to contribute to the work of the team. When a Patrol plans an adventure, the Scouts share the responsibilities. There aren't too many or too few members for most tasks that can be expected as a part of Scouting.

One idea to help you create your Patrols is for the fourth-year Scouts to collaborate on selecting Patrols. When selecting Patrols, senior Scouts should be encouraged to ask some important questions, such as:

- How can we make sure that the Patrols are made up of Scouts who will get along with each other?
- How can we make sure that there is a mixture of experience within a Patrol so that we can learn from each other?
- How can we make sure that every Patrol will be responsible and capable?
- Are there any siblings or close friendships that need special consideration?

Remember, Patrols are a crucial part of the Scout Method. The Patrol system is literally as old as Scouting itself, and there is no better way to make every Scout feel like part of the team.

Each Patrol is expected to plan to arrive at the Jamboree with all necessary gear to be self-sufficient, including all shelter and cooking gear. As well Scouters with responsibility for the patrol are expected to arrive with the Scouts.

SPICES

Scouting is about developing the whole person. The SPICES are the objectives underlying every adventure. The Plan-Do-Review model used for all aspects of the program encourages the growth of the youth in all the SPICES (social, physical, intellectual, character, emotional and spiritual). Ensure all youth experience and explore the SPICES throughout the week.

Each adventure will provide opportunities for you in more than one of the SPICES. Having had the experience of the adventure, the Scouter will know which SPICES were involved and then ask appropriate questions to facilitate the review. While we don't plan around the SPICES, development in one or more of the SPICES will naturally emerge in each adventure

The Jamboree will be a series of adventures. Sure, there are routines like meal preparation. How can you change them up and have more adventures? Maybe you can cook your own dinner. After that experience, ask yourself, "How can we make this better?"

BUDGETING & FUNDRAISING

The Jamboree fee covers all camp fees, all site and event preparations, program activities and a jamboree neckerchief & crest, but does not include food or transportation to and from the Jamboree. Some program activities have extra fees. For those travelling by plane, train, or scheduled bus service. The fee also includes transportation to and from the site from the Halifax airport, bus and rail stations and the Truro bus and train stations.

Your patrol is responsible for travel to Nova Scotia. Some Areas and Councils have made group travel arrangement for past Jamborees, so be sure to ask about any plans your Area or Council may be making. Stanfield International Airport in the Halifax Regional Municipality is the airport nearest the Jamboree site. If you will be travelling to Nova Scotia by air, this is the recommended point of arrival.

You will be buying groceries on site and planning your own meals. We estimate your food cost per patrol member will be \$20.00 to \$24.00 daily.

Remember these three principles for fundraising:

1. Make a big list of opportunities. Brainstorm with your family, friends and troop. Once you have your list, prioritize the ideas which will give you the best return for the time and effort you invest. Then plan and execute your fundraisers to earn success.
2. Set a goal to make contact with one of your sources every day. Use phone, email and letters.
3. Ask your family and friends for help. Your Group, Area and Council may also be able to give you leads.



HOW TO REGISTER

APPLICATION AND REGISTRATION

A copy of your on-line registration and payment should be sent to the Jamboree office at Scouts Canada CJ'17, Registrar, 84 Thorne Ave., Dartmouth, NS. B3B 1Y5. Applications postmarked after January 31, 2017 should be accompanied by the full Jamboree fee of \$600.00 per youth, and \$400.00 per Patrol Scouter

Recognizing that participant and patrol information may change before the Jamboree, changes can be advised by email (ndouglas@scouts.ca) to the Jamboree Office until 10 June 2017. No refunds will be made during the Jamboree, therefore any applicable refund cheques will be mailed following the Jamboree's conclusion.

REGISTRATION REFUND POLICY

In the event of a PARTICIPANT cancellation, full refunds will be issued until January 1, 2017. Participants withdrawing **AFTER January 1, 2017 BUT BEFORE May 1, 2017** will be assessed a \$50.00 National Jamboree cancellation fee. **NO REFUNDS WILL BE ISSUED** if cancellation occurs after May 1 2017.

Any fee refunds will be made to the Group the Patrol is affiliated with, addressed in care of the Patrol Scouter. Refund cheques will not be issued during the Jamboree

KEEPING RECORDS UP TO DATE

The Jamboree Office records all registration information received from Patrols and Offers of Service. The system provides full data on names and Subcamp locations of all registered Jamboree participants.

This function will move to the Jamboree site in June 2017 and will be utilized by Jamboree staff to provide information to participants and organizers.

Please ensure all registration and medical information, for both CJ and in MyScouts, is accurate and up-to-date before departing for the Jamboree site

JAMBOREE FEES

The Jamboree Fee has been determined by the Jamboree Planning team. The fee breaks down approximately as follows:

Site Development 18%

The development of all systems, roads, and facilities to the standards required to accommodate up to 10,000 people. After the Jamboree, we will return the camp to Nova Scotia Council in better shape than we received it.

Program 20%

This goes to provide all the program activities. It includes all the activity planning and preparations as well as all of the equipment needed (i.e. canoes) to run the programs that will be offered at CJ. It also covers the activities at St. Andrew's Plaza, the Opening Ceremony, and also the Canada 150th Birthday Party.

Jamboree Services 28%

This category provides for all of the support facilities need (such as Health Services, Safety Team, Subcamps, etc.) to ensure a great Jamboree experience for all. Transportation to and from the Airport, Bus/Train stations, and the off-site parking facility are also included here.

Administration / Planning 17%

This portion goes towards the expenses related to planning and administering a large event such as this. It includes planning meeting expenses, all aspects of participant and OOS registration, the Jamboree business office, program scheduling and finance expenses, operating the Quartermaster function, IT and Risk Management

LICENSES, INSURANCE, TAXES & CONTINGENCY 17%


An Event this size requires insurance and various licences and has to remit taxes, even as a charitable organization. We also plan for the unexpected by putting aside 10% of known expenses as a contingency for unforeseen expenses.

LOCATION



WEATHER

The weather in this part of Nova Scotia is very favorable for camping. A look at the last 5 years weather records tells us that the average day time temperature is 25° C; with cool evenings at an average of 14.6° C. Rain is infrequent, with an average of less than 2 mm of precipitation during the 8-15 July period.

INSECTS

Mosquitos are not that much of a problem, though small black-flies (no-see-ums) can be annoying. If you wander through the long grass, ticks may occasionally be experienced, though the more worrisome Deer Tick has not been identified in this part of Nova Scotia. The same precautions used for mosquitoes (DEET products) are equally effective against ticks. See also <http://www.scouts.ca/sites/default/files/safetytip-may-2015.pdf>. JAMBOREE EMERGENCY TELEPHONE

The Jamboree Emergency Telephone number will be communicated to all registered participants. Urgent messages for you will be relayed to you as soon as possible. You will then be asked to call back as it will not be possible to bring you to the phone to take an incoming call.

SUBCAMPS

The Subcamps are within walking distance of all areas of Camp Nedooae and the off-site program areas. The furthest walking distance may be as much as 2 km; though the most frequently visited locations are roughly 1 km from subcamps. The terrain is fairly flat in most areas, with stone covered roads. Good closed toe footwear is recommended. The subcamps are located in mixed vegetation with some grass, some shrubs and some small trees. Plan to bring smaller tents, housing 3-4 youth at the most. Dining tarps are strongly recommended.

Keeping in mind the Scout practice of low impact camping, we ask you to plan to practice low impact camping before coming out to the Jamboree. Remember, no cutting of live trees or other vegetation. Plan to carry all of your personal and patrol gear into your camp site from the main front gate. Remember these leave no trace principles (and see more at http://www.scouts.ca/sites/default/files/leave-no-trace_Scouts-booklet.pdf):

- Dispose of waste properly
- Leave what you find
- Respect wildlife
- Be considerate of others

Camp Nedooae is located within the boundaries of the Halifax Regional Municipality, which has a by-law which states that any temporary shelters 10' x 10' or greater must meet fire rating standards. All tents and marquees are subject to inspection by the Halifax Fire Marshall. Tents that do not meet by-law standards upon inspection by the Fire Marshall, will be dismantled and removed from the property. Tents meeting the standard bear a label which states "This Tent Material meets the requirements of the National Fire Protection Association Standard #701 (NFPA 701), "Standard Method of Fire Tests for Flame-Resistant Textiles and Films" or CAN/ULS-S109-M, Standard for Flame Test of Flame Resistant Fabrics and Films." Please check your tents in advance. If you are in doubt about whether your tent complies, please contact the Jamboree Office.

No open fires are allowed at the campsites, and all cooking must be done on camp stoves. Subcamp staff will be inspecting sites to ensure all safety precautions are followed.

Removal of turf, digging or trenching of any kind is not permitted. Underground water lines and cables have been laid throughout the site and can easily be damaged if care is not taken around them.

GETTING TO CAMP NEDOOAE

GETTING TO THE JAMBOREE

Arranging travel to and from the Jamboree is the responsibility of your patrol. Some Areas and Councils have made group travel arrangement for past Jamborees, so be sure to ask about any plans they may be making.

Patrols should plan to arrive on Friday 7 July or Saturday 8 July, and depart on Saturday 15 July. All patrol members should arrive at the site together.

If you are traveling by plane, bus or train, AND you communicate your travel plans to the Jamboree Registrar, the Jamboree will organize bussing from the airport at Halifax Stanfield International Airport (C-YHZ), and the train and bus stations at Halifax and Truro (preferred bus location).

If you are travelling by private vehicles you will be bussed from the off-site parking location.

Driving Yourself

If you choose to travel to the jamboree in a private vehicle as part of your Jamboree adventure, you will receive directions to the off-site parking location closer to the Jamboree date. Vehicles parked here will be monitored during the jamboree and generally will not be accessible until the close of the jamboree.

When arriving at the off-site parking facility you will unload all personal and patrol gear and then park your cars as directed by Jamboree staff. Once the full patrol of youth, scouters and gear are assembled, you will receive your registration welcome package and then be taken by bus to the Jamboree site. If required, troop/personal gear will be loaded in a van and will follow your bus to the site.

For the return journey, we will schedule you on Jamboree buses from the Jamboree site back to the off-site facility.

Transportation to the Jamboree Site for Air, Train and Scheduled Bus Travelers

Please look for a Travel Information form, which will be supplied to you closer to the Jamboree date. It is essential you provide your Patrol's travel plans to aid your movement onto the Jamboree site.

If you properly communicate your travel plans, via the Travel Information form, to the Jamboree you will be met at your bus station, train station, or airport, and given your registration package. You will then be transported by bus directly to the Jamboree.

Failure to submit a complete Travel Information form by the due date will jeopardize your smooth arrival to the Jamboree site.



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Arrival at the Jamboree Site for Contracted Bus and Coach Travellers

If arriving by a contracted bus or coach, you will be directed to the off-site parking facility, where you will receive your registration package. You will remain on the bus, which will then take you to the Jamboree site. The bus will then be directed back to the off site parking facility.

SHIPPING UNIT GEAR

Should a Patrol, Troop, Area or even Council be considering shipping gear to the Jamboree in advance of participant's arrival, please be aware that there will be a cost associated with having facilities ready at the Jamboree site to receive, offload, and store in a secure area.

Please contact CJ17Shipping@scouts.ca for guidance and procedures regarding size, shipping labels, weatherproofing, shipping labels and other matters.

Note: Shipments will not be accepted at the site unless we have been pre-advised and related procedures followed.



YOUR PATROL KIT

CAMP SITE

Patrols will be assigned camp sites of approximately 12m x 12m. Size will vary with the subcamp terrain and the size of your patrol.

TENTS

We recommend lightweight tents. Poles should be of good quality, and a full fly-sheet (reaching down to ground level) is highly recommended. Tents should accommodate 3 or 4 persons each. Tent assignments must be made according to Scouts Canada's policies as described in BP&P 10003. This insists on separate tents for boys, girls and Scouters.

Camp Nedooae is located within the boundaries of the Halifax Regional Municipality, which has a by-law which states that any temporary shelters 10' x 10' or greater must meet fire rating standards. All tents and marquees are subject to inspection by the Halifax Fire Marshall. Tents that do not meet by-law standards upon inspection by the Fire Marshall, will be dismantled and removed from the property. Tents meeting the standard bear a label which states "This Tent Material meets the requirements of the National Fire Protection Association Standard #701 (NFPA 701), "Standard Method of Fire Tests for Flame-Resistant Textiles and Films" or CAN/ULS-S109-M, Standard for Flame Test of Flame Resistant Fabrics and Films." Please check your tents in advance. If you are in doubt about whether your tent complies, please contact the Jamboree Office.

DINING SHELTER

For protection against the sun and poor weather you should bring a large tarp with a ridge rope, guy lines and pegs. Any temporary shelter of 10' x 10' or greater must have a current fire proof rating certificate affixed to the shelter. Halifax Fire Department will be conducting a site inspection prior to and during the Jamboree and have the authority to remove any shelters that do not meet by-laws for the Regional Municipality described above.

FLAGS

We encourage each unit to bring your National, Provincial, Town, and Scouting Section Flags with you to CJ. To see the Opening Ceremony and 150th Canada Day Celebration with hundreds of flags flying will add to the awesome experience. Note however: only recognized national flags and Scouting/Guiding Flags are permitted.

You are responsible for your own flags – keep them safe and secure at all times.

Removal of another unit's flag or flags, even if only borrowed without permission, is not acceptable behavior and will be subject to disciplinary action.

HOW TO PACK AND CARRY THE EQUIPMENT

Patrols traveling by Air should note all baggage allowance regulations established by the airline. Check with your carrier regarding size and weight restrictions.

Patrols should also check with their carrier (Air, Rail and Bus) about regulations for carrying camp stoves in luggage or patrol boxes. Propane and Naphtha cannot generally be carried on public transport. Cooking fuel will be available for purchase at the Jamboree through the Quartermaster.

SHARING THE LOAD

Regardless of the method you are planning to use to get your gear to the Jamboree site, it is recommended that sometime before the Jamboree, the Troop holds a packing night. All those going to the Jamboree should wear their travel clothes and bring their personal packs with all personal gear packed and ready to go. Ensure responsibility for carrying the Patrol equipment is shared in a fair and equitable manner amongst all patrol members.

Patrol members should then try to get as much personal and patrol gear into their packs, with the remainder being placed into Troop kit bags and distributed to balance the weight in each bag.

List all Patrol Gear and who is responsible for the final packing when you depart for the Jamboree. Attach a label to both the outside and on the inside of each pack of personal and/or patrol gear:

CHECKING AND USING PERSONAL AND PATROL EQUIPMENT

For an event like a Jamboree, you will sometimes buy new personal equipment (or have it bought for you!) and patrols may obtain new tents or cooking gear. Whether your gear is new or old, we strongly recommended that Patrols participate in at least one Jamboree pre-Camp in order to familiarize themselves with their equipment in preparation for the Jamboree.

Use this opportunity to:

- Practice packing all personal and patrol gear for travel, making sure you have enough personal gear as well as Patrol gear.
- Set up camp as a Patrol, after carrying all gear into the camp site.
- Break-in personal gear (hiking boots for example) so they don't cause problems while at CJ.
- Practice cooking on the stove you'll be taking to the Jamboree, look for damages and get repairs done.
- Practice cooking using the food on the suggested CJ Menu. This is the food that will be in plentiful supply at the CJ Grocery Stores. Other food will be available, but it's good to practice on what you know will be available.

Check on what additional gear you would like to take, or what gear you listed but don't think you'll need.

YOUR PATROL KITCHEN

MEAL PLANNING

Meals can be one of the highlights at a Jamboree if you make them special. Invite a friend from another patrol, or your subcamp Service Scouter. Plan a special meal to thank your Scouters or to celebrate a birthday. You plan it, make it happen, and then review it as a patrol to see if you would have done anything differently.

Cooking on lightweight equipment may be a new experience for many participants, so it is important that all patrol members practice cooking the food on the suggested menu when you have your Jamboree Pre-Camp, before you arrive at the Jamboree.

There will be a wide variety of food products available for purchase at the grocery stores on site, and the stores will be stocked with food products that align with the suggested menu. This is done to keep food prices down, while ensuring the food is fresh for you. The menu is pre-planned in accordance with Canada's Food Guide, but there will be other choices available.

Plan ahead of time when you need to buy food from the Grocery Store, as the line-ups may be long. You decide what you eat and how much you need, so be sure everyone on the patrol is involved in planning the meals and doing the shopping. As your patrol has to store unused food between meals and overnight, make sure the quantities you buy are reasonable, and that you have a container to store food in, particularly overnight.

When cooking, remember that **NO OPEN FIRES ARE PERMITTED.**

We highly recommend that propane be your fuel of choice for all cooking stoves. However, where a pressure type stove is used (e.g. Naphtha, or white gas), follow these simple rules after you've finished with the stove:

- Turn the stove off
- Allow all surfaces to cool
- Keep face well away from fuel container, open the container cap to release pressure
- Tighten the cap up again
- Clean down all surfaces

FUEL PURCHASE

5lb/10lb/20lb Propane Tanks will be available for rent and exchange or refill through the Quartermaster. Patrols bringing their own tanks should have the Unit Name and Number clearly marked on the tanks. 1 lb Propane canisters will be available for sale as will white gas (Naphtha) in sealed containers.

MENUS

The suggested menus will be worked out with our grocery stores and will be published on the web site as soon as they are available.

TIP: Pick up a copy of Field Book for Canadian Scouting from your Scout Shop for more tips and advice on setting up your kitchen.

CLEAN-UP AFTER MEALS

As soon as the designated cooks have finished preparing your meal, whoever has washing up duty should put a pan of water on the stove for heating, in preparation for washing up. While you are eating, the water will come to the boil and you will be ready to clean up immediately after your meal is finished.

In accordance with sound health practices, wash dishes in hot soapy water; rinse in hot clear water; then pass through hot water with a small amount of bleach (or other disinfectant) added. Then cover dishes with a clean cloth and let air-dry. Use phosphate free detergent as, unlike soap, it requires only a small quantity to work up good suds. The secret to effective cleaning of pots and pans is to use very hot water, so be very careful when you're doing the dish washing.

Your Subcamp Service Scouter will be closely checking on patrol food handling and dish washing practices throughout the Jamboree, and will be available to give you guidance in safe food preparation and proper dish washing if needed.

FOOD STORAGE

Camping at the Jamboree site requires special precautions concerning storage of food in order to avoid attracting animals. Bears, Skunks, Foxes, Raccoons, and Squirrels are all attracted by the smell of food. Do not, through carelessness, invite furry visitors to your Patrol campsite.

Observe the following precautions:

- After each meal, be certain that your Patrol campsite is clear of all food scraps and open containers.
- Do not keep any food, candy or chips, in your pockets or in your pack inside your tent as they could attract animals.
- Place any mint flavoured toothpaste in sealed plastic bags when you're not using it.
- Before dark, place any coolers with your patrol food in a designated area away from your tents.

Staples such as salt & pepper, dry foods that do not have strong odors (such as rice, macaroni, oatmeal) or unopened canned goods can be kept in a sealed container in your camp kitchen.

GREY WATER DISPOSAL

All grey water will be disposed of through the use of holding tanks which will be equipped with a filter system to prevent large food pieces, or personal utensils, from entering the waste water system. Make sure all large food pieces are scraped of dishes and pots before washing. This food must be placed in compost containers in accordance with Garbage and Recycling practices. No grey water is to be dumped anywhere other than the designated holding tanks.

ICE FOR FOOD PRESERVATION

Ice (in cubes and blocks) will be available to purchase from the Quartermaster. Make sure that food is kept in tightly sealed containers and under ice to avoid wastage. You should bring a cooler with your unit gear, though you will be able to rent coolers from the Quartermaster by booking in advance. Details will be posted on the CJ'17 web site.

RECYCLING AND GARBAGE DISPOSAL

As always, our goal at any Jamboree is to make it the most environmentally friendly ever. To achieve this, we all need to work together and the most important thing that each one of us can do is to reduce the amount of garbage and recyclables that each of us generates.

Each patrol and scout can help through good planning of meals and by using reusable containers whenever possible. For example, take cloth / reusable shopping bags to get your groceries.

Waste products left after a meal should be sorted into material that can be recycled (such as cardboard, paper products), and food waste that can be composted.

The Province of Nova Scotia has excellent recycling & garbage disposal practices, which we will follow.

At numerous locations around the Jamboree (such as at St. Andrew's Plaza; in the program areas; and at the Trading Post) you will see recycling and garbage stations with bins clearly labelled for sorting recyclable items. Please make sure you practice good stewardship of our environment.

Fire Buckets will be clearly marked and must not be used for garbage. This is a Fire Safety issue.

WATER SUPPLY

The primary water system for the Jamboree Subcamps will consist of newly installed buried lines. Most water drawn at the Jamboree is from the lake and is treated to the highest of standards. It is cold and all lines are pressurized. Taps are located within easy carrying distance of each patrol camp site. Water must be carried, in containers that you bring, from the taps to your campsite. No drinking or washing is to be done at the taps. It is important that water not be wasted. Turn taps off when you have filled your water container.

Should a break in a waterline occur, notify your Scouter and the nearest Service Scouter or Subcamp Headquarters immediately.

YOUR PERSONAL KIT

UNIFORM

You may travel in uniform or program activity wear if you wish, but it is not a requirement. We do suggest however, that all patrol members wear your group neckerchief and/or other Scouts Canada identifiers.

IDENTIFICATION

Once registered at the Jamboree site you are required to wear the Jamboree wrist-band at all times and in full view (i.e. not hidden under sleeves). These bracelets will be included in your arrivals package. Patrol Scouters and Offers of Service will be required to wear photo identification on a lanyard at all times. These will also be provided in your arrivals package.

Appropriate activity wear must be worn for program activities. Some program activities have specific clothing requirements. The program planning guide will have more details.

Minimum identification for off-site activities will be the Jamboree neckerchief, together with your wrist-band.

To replace lost Jamboree identification you will have to go to Jamboree Administration with a piece of personal identification and be accompanied by your Scouter with Jamboree ID, to request a replacement. This will enable us to confirm your identification on Jamboree records and issue the replacement. This will take time so take all precautions to ensure your Jamboree ID is not lost.

CARRYING YOUR GEAR

We recommend you carry your personal gear in a backpack or frame rucksack. Packs should be fitted properly for the person using it, and be capable of carrying personal gear and a fair share of Patrol gear.

A daypack is necessary for off-site trips for carrying your packed lunch. We also recommend a reusable container for your lunch. Be sure it's large enough to contain your sandwich, a piece of fruit and a drink container.

Also bring footwear suitable for wearing in the water, to protect you from rocks and stones.

Prescription Medicine in the original labelled container, is to be given to Scouter in charge with written instructions for usage

TIP: Pick up a copy of Field Book for Canadian Scouting from your Scout Shop for more tips and advice on selecting, sizing and caring for your personal gear.

PERSONAL KIT LIST

The following list is a guide to help you plan your trip. You are responsible for your own belongings. There will be no safekeeping facilities for your valuables at CJ, so make sure that your personal articles are covered by your residential home insurance policy.

Your name and CJ Patrol number should be on every article of personal gear. This will help the Lost & Found Department return your items to you.

NEED TO KNOW

BANKING

A number of ATMs will be located on site for cash withdrawals. There will be a per transaction fee for this service.

Grocery stores, the Trading Post and canteens will accept credit/debit cards, cash or traveler's cheques. They will not accept personal or group cheques.

Traveler's cheques cannot be cashed on site without making a purchase. If bringing Traveler's cheques, they should be in denominations of CAD \$50.00 or smaller, as large value cheques may be refused by vendors.

ELECTRICITY

There will be no access to electrical outlets in each Subcamp. Power outlets throughout the camp are not to be used by participants for any reason.

There will be a facility at the jamboree for charging personal electrical devices for a small fee.

FOOD CONCESSIONS

A number of canteens, offering confectionery, fast food products and soft drinks, will be located at St. Andrew's Plaza and possibly at other locations. Opening hours will be posted at each location.

FUEL PURCHASE

5lb/10lb/20lb Propane Tanks will be available for rent and exchange or refill through the Quartermaster. Patrols bringing their own tanks should have the Unit Name and Number clearly marked on the tanks. 1 lb Propane canisters will be available as will white gas (Naphtha) in sealed containers.

NEWSPAPER

A Jamboree newspaper will be published each day of the Jamboree to keep participants informed of Jamboree happenings. It will include stories, pictures, announcements, competitions, program events, and many more interesting features. The paper will be distributed free to all CJ participants by Subcamp staff. We will also endeavor to have it posted online so that parents and family members at home can see and experience the Jamboree also.

PORTABLE TOILETS

Portable toilets will be used through the Jamboree. Please keep these facilities clean. At times of pumping out, the supplier will wash and disinfect each toilet. Toilets will only be as clean as you keep them.

POST OFFICE

The Jamboree Post Office will be located in St. Andrew's Plaza. It will operate daily during the Jamboree. It will sell stamps, handle outgoing mail and sort incoming mail for delivery to Subcamps where it will be delivered to you.

QUARTERMASTER

Some Jamboree materials and equipment will be available for sale after the Jamboree has concluded. These items can be purchased on site during or after the Jamboree. Normally those who make purchases are:

- Jamboree Participants
- Scout Councils
- Offers of Service
- The general public in a post-Jamboree sale.

A catalogue of the items available, with details of purchase and pickup, will be available for participants to review at the QM Store from Thursday 13th July until Saturday 15th July 2017.

RADIO STATION

A Jamboree radio station will also be operating during the Jamboree. Look for details as they are announced on our website.

SHOWER SYSTEM

Only bio-degradable soap may be used in the showers. The showers have a supplemental water supply system, so you are not to drink the shower water. Showers will be regulated in terms of when they will be available for usage. In order to reduce the volume of water used, please shower as quickly as possible and use a low or phosphate free shampoo.

SPIRITUAL OBSERVANCES

Throughout the Jamboree there will be times when Scouts and Scouters will gather for spiritual observances. Check with the Subcamp Headquarters or Care Corps for a list of when and where these will be occurring.

ST. ANDREW'S PLAZA

This is the hub of the Jamboree, and is located beside the main gate and you'll see it as soon as you enter camp. It will be an easy place to find and to meet your Scouting friends and visitors from across Canada and around the world who plan to come to CJ'17. This is where you'll get to see and interact with some great activities, take part in various challenges, earn crests, meet special guests, and even scale the heights of our climbing wall. There will be displays, activities, concession stands, and vendors. No shortage of exciting and interesting things to do. Check out the CJ'17 Radio Station and perhaps get interviewed on the air. More details will be posted on our web site and in the Jamboree Newspaper.

TRADING POST

Always a Jamboree highlight, the Trading Post will again offer a full range of souvenirs and gift items. Conveniently located at the main entrance, by the gateway leading up to the Subcamps, the Trading Post will also have camping equipment available and accessories for sale. Crest and Badges are always of interest, and there will be plenty of choices for you. The Trading Post will be open daily from 9:00am to 9:00pm, except during the Opening Ceremony and Canada's 150th Birthday Party.



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PROTECT YOURSELF

LIFE THREATENING ALLERGIES

If you have an allergy that requires the use of an epi-pen or similar device, it is essential that you keep it with you at all times in a readily accessible waist pouch. Bring a second epi-pen for a back up and give it to one of your Patrol Scouters. Make sure your epi-pens will not expire during the Jamboree and are functional. Make sure your Patrol Scouters and Patrol members know you use an epi-pen and be sure they know how to use it. Please ensure your need to use an epi-pen is listed on your medical forms.

IMPORTANT NOTE:

While we will do everything we can to control and restrict the presence of nuts or nut by-products at the Jamboree, we cannot make this a Nut Free Camp. All participants should be aware of the risks of bringing nut products into camp. Make sure no one around you has serious allergies that your action could trigger.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL

Each patrol must be prepared to deal with minor injuries and have a small first aid kit for that purpose. Every injury, no matter how small or insignificant, must be given attention.

Patrol Scouters have a responsibility to keep a record of all injuries and incidents. Incident Reports are to be completed and e-mailed or faxed to National HQ as soon as possible. During the Jamboree, this can be done through the Jamboree Administration office located in the Duncan Centre.

There will be a number of First Aid posts throughout the Jamboree Site, and there will be a clinic located at the Duncan Centre. The First Aider team will determine if any ill or injured person should be sent to the clinic for attention. During night hours, the Subcamp HQ should be informed of the need for First Aiders who will be immediately dispatched to the location.

The Subcamp Headquarters should be kept advised of any situations regarding youth or Scouters assigned to their Subcamp. They will keep a record of any participants sent to the clinic or transported to the local hospital and will follow up on the status of all patients, and relay this to the Patrol Scouter.

Each participant must provide the number and other details of their parent's or guardian's Provincial Medicare Plan and/or supplemental health insurance plan. Patrol Scouters may require access to sufficient funds to cope with the payment for treatment provided, until they are reimbursed. A clear arrangement is required between the Scouters and parents/guardians. Information about insurance provided by Scouts Canada is included in this document.

All Scouting members have a responsibility to report any incident, by completing an Incident Report Form. In case of uncertainty, Scouters should discuss the matter with the Subcamp Chief who can then draw on additional resources as necessary.

Scouts Canada Incident Report Form

Please submit an incident report for any behaviour or event that raises safety concerns (examples: injury, illness, behaviour inconsistent with the Code of Conduct, property damage, and complaints). Any questions about this process should be sent to safety@scouts.ca.

OTHER INSURANCE

As per BP&P, Section 10004, Parents are responsible for transporting or arranging for transport of their children to and from Scouting activities. Parents must give their explicit permission to have their children transported by Group arranged buses or private vehicles.

Vehicles owned and operated by volunteers must be insured by the owner under the provincial law of their domicile and be operated by duly licensed and insured drivers.

Volunteers who drive Scouting members do so at their own risk. Scouts Canada strongly suggests Scouters, other Scouting members and/or parent volunteers who use their vehicles to transport passengers carry a minimum of \$1,000,000 Liability Insurance, and further recommend at least \$1,000,000 per passenger on their vehicle. Individuals are encouraged to review their individual circumstances with the insurance advisors to ensure they have adequate coverage.

Note: Offers of Service volunteers who are not members of Scouts Canada are not covered by Scouts Canada's National Indemnity Insurance. If you are not a Scouts Canada member, check with your own insurance company to make sure that you have the coverage you want.

Accident and sickness insurance coverage should also be arranged if a participant's hospitalization and medical coverage is not adequate for out-of-province illnesses or accident situations.



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STAY SAFE

JAMBOREE SECURITY

The Jamboree Safety Teams main responsibility will be to provide security at the Jamboree (including off-site parking and program areas). The Safety Teams Headquarters is located in the Quonset hut near the barn opposite St. Andrew's Plaza. Should you require their assistance, notify your Service Scouter or go to your Subcamp Headquarters and have a Scouter there notify the Safety Team.

The Safety Team will be providing 24/7 coverage of the Jamboree Site and is there to ensure everyone has a great Jamboree experience. The Director of the Safety Team suggests that the patrols carry a small photo album containing a recent photograph of each member. This will assist if there's a need to search for a missing youth.

The Jamboree Fire Teams main responsibility is to monitor the Jamboree site for unsafe conditions that may involve fire. They will be working with patrols to ensure your camp sites are safe, that proper fuel handling procedures are being followed, and that each site has required fire suppression tools and equipment.

Should a fire occur, shout FIRE as loudly as possible, get everyone away from the fire location, and advise your Service Scouter and Subcamp Headquarters immediately.

Local Police (RCMP), Fire Service and Ambulance/EMS Officers may be seen at the Jamboree. We have been working closely with local authorities to ensure a safe Jamboree for all, and we have extended an open invitation for their officers to look around the site at any time.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS

The utmost care must be taken to ensure that a fire does not occur at the Jamboree. The lighting of cooking stoves and the handling of fuel must be skillfully and properly done. Patrol Leaders and Scouters must ensure that all participants, regardless of age or experience, know how to safely refuel and light both stoves and lanterns as part of their Jamboree preparations.

Storing fuel containers within your camp site is another hazard. Ensure unused fuel is stored in a clearly marked area, away from the cooking and sleeping areas.

Besides the obvious fire hazard, unwanted stove fuel is a hazardous waste and must be disposed of properly. Facilities will be provided in each Subcamp at the end of the Jamboree for you to recycle unused fuel.

In lightweight tents, your Patrols should sleep with their heads towards the door. If closed, the door should be easily opened to facilitate quick exit in case of fire. No open flames of any nature are permitted in tents.

FIRE REGULATIONS

No matches or fuel burning devices are to be lit in tents.

If a fire starts;

- Yell FIRE as loud as possible.
- Remove everyone from around the fire location.
- Report the location to the Subcamp Headquarters.
- Use fire suppression material available in your camp site (bucket of sand). Do not use water on fuel fires.
- Turn off all stove or lantern burner valves as soon as it is safe to do.

If clothing is on fire, do not run. Stop, Drop, and Roll until the fire is smothered.

Never light a fuel burning device at the same place it was just fueled. Never refuel or light them inside a tent. Wipe up any fuels spills and never refuel a hot lantern, stove or other fuel burning device.

Never use cooking stoves inside the tent.

Do not store fuel in your tent or cooking area; use an unoccupied area.

Know the location of the Subcamp Headquarters.

Give fire fighters and their equipment room to work. Move away.

Obey the directions of the Fire Patrols.

No open fires permitted under any circumstances.

Fuel burning devices in your camp site must be extinguished before 11 pm at night, or before you go to sleep, whichever is earlier. Have your flashlight nearby in your tent, ready for use.

Be sure your entire Patrol knows the location of the assembly area where you are supposed to go in the event of a fire.

LOCATION OF PATROL MEMBERS

It is the Patrol Scouters responsibility to know where members of the patrol are at all times and to set up a routine to ensure this.

Establish a buddy system so that your patrol members know the location of their assigned buddy.

When the patrol is away from the patrol campsite, arrange to meet at a central location from time to time.

LOST AND FOUND

Items found in the Subcamp should be turned in to the Services Centre. The Services Centre will make every effort to return found items to their rightful owner if the item is properly labeled with the name and patrol number of the owner. Other items will be held until claimed or disposed of at the end of the Jamboree.

If you are missing an item, after thoroughly checking the inside of your tent, sleeping bag and backpack, check in with Lost & Found, they probably have it!

Note: There will be no safekeeping facilities at the Jamboree for storing valuable personal articles. If you bring cameras, radios, or other personal belongings of high value, make sure that they are covered by family insurance policy against damage or loss, or consider leaving these items at home



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YOUR ARRIVAL AT CAMP NEDOOAE

ACTION ON ARRIVAL

To get Patrols into their Subcamp as quickly as possible we will be doing most check in registration activities off the Jamboree site. Registrations staff will confirm each patrol's details at these check in points. To help move your patrol through the check in point as quickly as possible, the Patrol Scouter and Patrol Leader should have the following ready for review by registration staff:

- Your completed patrol arrival form
- A copy of your transportation form with any changes noted
- A cheque payable to Scouts Canada for any unpaid fees (if any).

When your patrol arrives at the checkpoint you will receive an arrivals package. Patrols that have paid all fees in full and have no changes to their patrol members will receive a green sticker on your arrival package. You may then proceed directly to the Jamboree where you will be met and guided to your Subcamp. Patrols that have changed members without previously advising the Registrar, or those that still have fees owing, will receive a red sticker. You will be directed to the Registrations tent on the Jamboree site to correct any registration issues with the Registrar. Once the issue is resolved, Subcamp staff will guide you to your Subcamp.

ON-SITE TRANSPORTATION

The only vehicles permitted within the site will be identified as service vehicles. Certain service teams such as First Aid and Safety will be permitted to use bicycles. All other traffic will be on foot.

Patrol members will be required to hike all personal and patrol gear up to a kilometer distance to your campsite, after unloading at the camp entrance.

No personal vehicles, trailers or campers/RV's will be allowed on site.


JAMBOREE STAFF OR OFFERS OF SERVICE

More than 1,000 Scouters and others have volunteered to work at the Jamboree to ensure that participants enjoy a well organized and well operated event.

The volunteers have been organized into different departments and functions. Volunteers are recognized by their distinctive Identification Card which they will wear on a lanyard at all times. The first volunteers you are likely to meet are on the buses or on site from your assigned Subcamp who will help you get to your camp site as quickly as possible.

SUBCAMPS

There are six Subcamps for participants. Patrols will be randomly allocated to different Subcamps throughout the Jamboree. Patrols from Manitoba for example, should not expect to be assigned to the Subcamp representing Manitoba Council. Each Subcamp will endeavor to provide some background and atmosphere representing the host council, while also embracing the patrols from across the country. The purpose is to enable each patrol to meet and learn from fellow scouts from across Canada and even internationally.



You will be advised of your Subcamp allocation well before you leave home for the Jamboree.

PATROL SITES AT THE SUBCAMP

Your patrol will be assigned a campsite by the Subcamp Staff. These will be up to 12m x 12m, depending on patrol size and terrain. Each patrol will be loaned a 3m long picnic table and are asked to make sure this table is taken care of and returned in good condition. You will have to obtain your picnic table from a central supply at the Subcamp, and return it to that area at the conclusion of the Jamboree.

Patrols may camp together with other registered patrols if required. Request to camp together must be made through your patrol registration form at least one month prior to the jamboree. Both patrols should make the request to camp together.

THE SERVICE SCOUTER IN YOUR SUBCAMP

Each Subcamp has a number of Service Scouters especially chosen for their ability to help Jamboree Patrols. The Service Scouters will be there to assist in ensuring that every member of the patrol, including the Scouters, have a great scouting experience at the Jamboree.

Each Service Scouter has a number of Patrols to serve, and will live in a tent in the Subcamp. The Service Scouter is the link between the patrol and the Subcamp Chief, and is the person to get to know and to seek out for help or information on all matters. Your Service Scouter has the resources of the Subcamp and the Jamboree staff, to call upon if needed and they will be helpful with any problems or challenges that your patrol may have. At the same time, the Service Scouter will be looking out for safety issues, such as how the patrol handles stoves and lanterns.

While your Patrol Scouter is responsible for the patrol, he/she is also accountable to the Subcamp Chief through the Service Scouter while at the Jamboree. For good reason, you must keep your service scouter informed about any issues or concerns regarding the patrol.

The Service Scouter will be vitally interested, for health reasons, in the cleanliness of your campsite, cooking gear, and eating utensils. The Service Scouter will insist that all recyclable materials and waste food remaining after each meal is properly disposed of in the garbage/recycling area.

In the absence of Patrols, Service Scouters also have the authority to drop tents and otherwise secure the patrol camp site in the event of inclement weather or for emergency purposes.

CARE CORPS

The Jamboree Care Corps is made up of experienced and qualified people trained in emotional support. It is also made up of clergy and lay people from all faiths and backgrounds trained in spiritual services as well as providing emotional support.

Each Subcamp has at least 2-3 designated Care Corps people on staff to provide support to patrol youth and scouters throughout the Jamboree. Jamborees can sometimes be overwhelming for some people. The Care Corps staff is available to help in times of conflict, emotional distress, homesickness, and so on. They are also available to offer support if difficult news from home needs to be shared with a youth or adult.

The Care Corps will provide faith services and reflective times throughout the Jamboree. Times and locations for these will be posted at each Subcamp headquarters as well as in the Services Centre. The Care Corps Headquarters, located in the Services Centre, also offers a quiet area where participants and staff can get away from the hustle and bustle of the Jamboree to relax, play some board games, cards, or just chat with someone. All participants should feel free to drop around the Care Corps for any reason or even just to say Hi.

On Sunday 9 July 2017, an interfaith service will be offered at 10:00 am at the main stage. All are welcome to attend.

SERVICES CENTRE

Located centrally to the Subcamps themselves there is a Services Centre that can also assist you. At the Centre there will be Jamboree volunteers who can help with Program questions; information regarding evening activities; spiritual observance opportunities; what's happening in St. Andrews Plaza; and so on.

The central Lost and Found will be located at the Services Centre.

YOUR JAMBOREE WEEK

KEY DATES

The Jamboree will be held at Camp Nedooae from Saturday 8 July 2017 through Saturday 15 July 2017 with the Opening Ceremony scheduled for the evening of Saturday 8 July 2017, starting at 7:00 pm.

Your patrol will be permitted on site from 1:00pm Friday 7 July only. If you plan on arriving in the area earlier you will need to make arrangements to camp elsewhere until Camp Nedooae opens at 1:00 pm on July 7. If you need ideas you can ask for help from the Jamboree Office.

SATURDAY 8 JULY 2017

This is the best day for you to plan to arrive. You'll have time to set up your camp site, dining tarps, kitchen area and cooking stoves. You'll be living and sleeping on this site for 8 days, so do everything you can to make it as comfortable as possible from the start is important. What do you think is needed?

Once you've finished your set-up, you get out with your patrol to have a look around Camp Nedooae and get an idea of the exciting places you will be visiting. See where the Grocery Stores and other facilities like showers; toilets; recycling are located. Have a look in to your Subcamp Headquarters and get to know the folks who will be helping you all week. Stop by the Services Centre and see what's happening there. St. Andrew's Plaza will be open from 12 noon, so be sure to check that out.

After your patrol has had dinner you can start to wander down to the beach area and get comfortable in front of the Main Stage, where the Opening Ceremony will start at 7:00pm.

SUNDAY 9 JULY 2017

The day will commence with various spiritual observances. An inter-faith Scouts Own will be held at 10:00am at the Main Stage.

The first of ten regular program sessions start at 1:30pm.

MONDAY 10 JULY 2017

The second and third program sessions will run from 9:00am to noon and from 1:30pm to 4:30pm.

TUESDAY 11 JULY 2017

The fourth and fifth program sessions will run from 9:00am to noon and from 1:30pm to 4:30pm.

WEDNESDAY 12 JULY 2017

The sixth and seventh program sessions will run from 9:00am to noon and from 1:30pm to 4:30pm.

THURSDAY 13 JULY 2017

The eighth program session is scheduled for this day will finish at noon. There is no scheduled program session in the afternoon. During the afternoon period you will be invited to join in with Sub-Camp Activities that will be focused on The Canadian Experience. Other activities will also be taking place in St. Andrew's Plaza.

After dinner, be sure to wear your finest red & white outfits, flags, banners, and noise makers, and help us to Celebrate Canada's 150th Birthday down at the main stage, starting at 7:00pm.

FRIDAY 14 JULY 2017

The ninth and tenth program periods are scheduled for Friday.

Flag lowering ceremony, and closing of the Jamboree, will take place at 7:00 pm at numerous places around the Jamboree.

SATURDAY 15 JULY 2017

All patrols are to depart from the site.

TIPS FOR THE PROGRAM DAYS

Be Self-Contained

Plan to be fully self-contained each day. By reading the description of your day's activities, you can likely determine if your meals will be eaten as a picnic or on the trail, so be prepared to pack easily carried lunches. Remember to bring sufficient water with you.

Lunches

On program days you will not likely have time to return to your campsite and prepare a meal, so you should plan to pack and bring a box lunch when you leave your campsite in the morning.

Day Trips

If you are leaving the Jamboree site by bus for a full day trip activity, you will require a day pack to carry things like:

- Lunch
- Camera
- Hat
- Rain Gear
- Sun Screen
- Sunglasses
- Extra Clothing
- Water
- Swim Wear
- Towel
- Souvenirs

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YOUR JAMBOREE DAY

YOUR PATROL PROGRAM

Your patrol will work together to choose a variety of activities from which your patrol program will be designed. Descriptions of these activities will be published in the Jamboree Program Guide and will also be available on our web page at www.scouts.ca/cj17

Your program consists of a maximum of ten 3 hour program periods. You could have booked up to 30 hours of activities, but may well have scheduled some free time to relax after a busy day; or just do some of your own patrol directed activities.

If you have any questions regarding your program, please work with one of the Program Advisors in the Subcamps Services Centre. They can explain any special clothing you need to take, where the activity is being conducted, and so on. They can also assist you in making changes if you like. Please be aware that changes take time, so the earlier you talk to a Program Advisor, the better.

A TYPICAL JAMBOREE DAY

7:00 am	Rise & Shine
7:30 am	Prepare Breakfast and clean up
8:00 am	Prepare Bag Lunches to take with you
8:30 am	Leave your camp site, head to your program area
9:00 am	Program Period
12:00 noon	Lunch
1:30 pm	Program Period
4:30 pm	Return to your camp site
5:00 pm	Meal Time & Free Time
10:00 pm	Everyone back in your own camp site
11:00 pm	Lights Out & Quiet

Note:

- Some activities may require more than one activity period
- Some activities can be completed within the 3 hour activity period resulting in you completing 2 or more activities in that time frame.
- If your activity is Off Site and requires Bus transportation, plan for your entire Patrol to be at the bus boarding point by the main entrance at least 30 minutes before the scheduled bus departure. The buses will leave on time, if you are on board, or not!

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

The Jamboree Program Guide contains a list of all program activities. Note any special requirements that you or your Patrol members will need to participate in the activity. The description will give Patrols some indication of the level of challenge in the activity.

For a number of reasons, some program activities may be cancelled. The Program Schedule you receive will NOT contain any cancelled activities. If some activities need to be closed down because of weather or safety, we will make every effort to reschedule you into an activity of similar interest and challenge.

LUNCHTIME MEALS

You are asked to bring a box lunch, or come fully self-contained each day. This means you need to bring appropriate food with you. By reading the description of the activity, you can likely determine if your meals will be eaten as a picnic or on the trail. This will help you determine the type of food to bring with you.

Remember to bring sufficient water with you.

OFF-SITE EQUIPMENT & CLOTHING

Please note the Special Requirements column in the Jamboree Program Guide. Most requirements will be listed there.

DAY TRIPS

If you are leaving the Jamboree site by bus for a full Day Trip activity, each member of your Patrol will require a Day Pack to carry things like:

- Lunch
- Camera
- Hat
- Rain Gear
- Sun Scree
- Sunglasses
- Extra Clothing
- Water
- Swim Wear
- Towel
- Souvenirs

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

In addition to your patrols scheduled program activities, there will be a number of special events and activities at the Jamboree.

Ceremonies

On Saturday 8th July at 7:00pm, all Scouts and Scouter are invited to the Opening Ceremony at the Main Stage, down by the lake. Come prepared, bring your section flag, your loud voices, your scouting spirit and your enthusiasm. Look to be amazed as we start your Jamboree Experience off with high energy.

On Thursday 13th July at 7:00 pm be ready for a huge birthday party. Bring your Canadian Flags, red & white outfits; hats, scarfs and anything else that shouts out your pride in Canada as we celebrate its 150th Birthday. Be prepared to amaze the neighbors, because they've all been invited too.

On Friday 14th July at 7:00pm we ask that all patrols pause for a moment, around the closest Canadian & Jamboree Flags, as we quietly lower the flags and bring the 13th Canadian Jamboree to a close.

Subcamp Programs

Your Subcamp is also a location for other programs. In addition to a variety of quiet time activities, the Subcamp teams will have other activities going on. Check with your Service Scouter to find out what's happening.

St. Andrew's Plaza

This is the hub of the Jamboree, and is located beside the main gate and you'll see it as soon as you enter camp. It will be an easy place to find and to meet your Scouting friends and visitors from across Canada and around the world who plan to come to CJ17

This is where you'll get to see and interact with some great activities, take part in various challenges, earn crests, meet special guests, and even scale the heights of our climbing wall. There will be displays, activities, concession stands, and vendors. No shortage of exciting and interesting things to do. Check out the CJ17 Radio Station and perhaps get interviewed on the air.

More details will be posted on our web site and in the Jamboree Newspaper.

Trading Post

Always a Jamboree highlight, the Trading Post will again offer a full range of souvenirs and gift items.

Conveniently located at the main entrance, by the gateway leading up to the Subcamps, the Trading Post will also have camping equipment available and accessories for sale. Crest and Badges are always of interest, and there will be plenty of choices for you.

PROGRAM NOTES

Some Program Activities may require an additional user fee. These are noted in Jamboree Program Guide, and all fees have to be paid before the start of the Jamboree. Unpaid user fees for an off-site activity may result in the cancellation of that activity.

There are lots of water programs at CJ17 so check for Special Requirements in the Program Planning Guide. There are also other activities where it is quite likely that you will get wet and you may want to be wearing a bathing suit. These are all noted in the Program Planning Guide.

Swimming Areas are designated and supervised by lifeguards. Swimming is permitted only at the supervised locations during scheduled swim periods. A Scouter must accompany your Patrol to the swimming area and provide assistance in ensuring that safety regulations are followed.

During water activities, other than supervised swimming, Personal Floatation Devices (PFDs) are required to be worn, regardless of swimming ability.




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SITE MAP



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REVIEWING YOUR JAMBOREE ADVENTURE

USING A REVIEW TO CHANGE THE COURSE OR ALTER THE PATROL APPROACH

During the Jamboree there will be many opportunities for your Patrol to Review their Jamboree experience. A review could take place during or after an activity. The review is a team effort, where your Patrol can reflect on how things went, what was learned and what might be done differently.

ENGAGING YOUR PATROL IN A MEANINGFUL REVIEW

In preparing to review you will need to decide:

- When? –Will your Patrol be ready to review and not too tired from the experience?
- Where? –Is the setting comfortable?
- How? –Will the review be a discussion or a game format?
- Informal/Formal? – Will the review be casual or more structured and detailed
- How Many? –Will this be a individual review or Patrol review?

USING SPICES IN THE REVIEW

The SPICES, as the core dimensions, are always in mind as you are mentored in the planning and doing. SPICES also form the basis for reflection during a review. To guide your Patrol in reflecting on their experiences, Scouts and Scouters can ask questions related to each of the six SPICES dimensions

- Social
- Physical
- Intellectual
- Character
- Emotional
- Spiritual

POST JAMBOREE REVIEW

This is an important step in the Review process as it provides opportunities for your Patrol to review lessons learned, individual and Patrol accomplishments and celebrate the entire Jamboree experience. Consider inviting your parents to a special presentation by your Patrol so that you can share your CJ17 story.

SPICES—Questions to Ask the Youth as the Activities are Reviewed

Which of the SPICES have you touched on in this Adventure?

Social
 Physical
 Intellectual
 Character
 Emotional
 Spiritual

Remember: Not every one of the six SPICES will be part of every Adventure, but over the course of the year, all the SPICES will be engaged many times.

Scouters: Avoid questions that can be answered with “yes” or “no”; pose questions in a way that encourages Scouts to reflect sincerely and share their thoughts.



I work with others as part of a team, sometimes leading and sometimes participating.

- What did you learn about leading and following?
- How did you get along with others?
- How did you work with those who had different skills and abilities?
- How did you make your community a better place to live?
- What did you learn about working with others?



I am true to myself and I treat others with kindness and respect.

- What did you learn about myself?
- What good turns did you complete?
- How did you give meaningful service?
- What meaningful experiences did you have?
- How did you set a good example for others?



I take care of my body and keep it healthy with good food and exercise.

- How did you physically challenge yourself?
- How did you overcome a physical challenge?
- How did you improve my physical health and fitness?
- What did you do to improve my capabilities in a physical activity?
- What did you learn from exploring a new environment?
- How did you improve my nutrition?



I talk about my feelings and share them in helpful ways.

- How did you deal with a difficult situation?
- What did you learn about leadership?
- Who are some good people you can turn to when you need help?



I love learning, creating, imagining and discovering.

- How did you blaze your own trail?
- What did you discover about how you learn?
- What do you know now that you did not know before?
- What skills did you improve?
- What skills would you like to further develop?



I'm part of something bigger than myself: my family, my community, the world and God. I respect what others believe.

- What are your personal principles, beliefs and values?
- How have your values evolved?
- What did I learn about others' beliefs and values?
- How did you improve your understanding of others?
- What do you have in common with those whose beliefs are different from your own?

CANADIAN PATH

Youth-led

A solid Canadian Path troop experience has Scouts actively engaged and leading the preparation, delivery and review of their own adventures. This means more than providing a few Trail Cards, having the scouts read them and then doing the activities.

As the Scouter, you will mentor, inspire and encourage the youth; oversee risk management, and participate in the decision making.

Your Jamboree Planning Team is working on a framework which will help the patrol to determine the focus for your collective Jamboree adventure. Scouters like yourself will collaborate with the planning of the day-to-day program and ensure that every scout is engaged in that program.

Scouters and the Jamboree staff and volunteers facilitate the great, safe adventures you plan and execute.

Plan-Do-Review

You will mentor the plan, do and review of the activities chosen by the patrol. Of course, actually doing the activities is when you and the scouts will have the most fun. Reviewing should not wait until the end of the Jamboree or the end of the day. The Jamboree staff will help you work with the Patrol to review your activities at key opportunities every day. A review can be done while waiting for lunch, hiking out to the beach or enjoying a campfire. Even free time can be reviewed. What did the scouts do? What did they learn? How can they improve on their next activity?

In preparing for the Jamboree, don't forget to incorporate the SPICES into the reviews (see video at <https://youtu.be/iaUCeNAsN-o>).

SPICES

Scouting is about developing the whole person. The SPICES are the objectives underlying every adventure. The Plan-Do-Review model used for all aspects of the program encourages the growth of the youth in all the SPICES (social, physical, intellectual, character, emotional and spiritual). Ensure all youth experience and explore the SPICES throughout the week.

Each adventure will provide opportunities for you to in more than one of the SPICES. Having had the experience of the adventure, you will know which SPICES were involved and then ask appropriate questions to facilitate the review. While we don't plan around the SPICES, development in one or more of the SPICES will naturally emerge in each adventure

The Jamboree will be a series of adventures. Sure, there are routines like meal preparation. How can the patrol members change them up and have more adventures? Maybe they can cook your own dinners. After that experience, encourage the scouts to ask, "How can we make this better?"

ACCEPTING THE CHALLENGE

The Jamboree will be held at Camp Nedooae, in Nova Scotia from Saturday 8 July 2017 through until Saturday 15 July 2017. Patrols will be permitted on site starting Friday 7 July. If you plan on arriving earlier than that, we will assist you in making arrangements to camp elsewhere until Camp Nedooae opens at 1:00 pm on 7 July.

Use your arrival day to set up your camp site, dining tarps, kitchen area and cooking stoves. You'll be living and sleeping on this site for 8 days, so do everything you can to make it as comfortable as possible. Once you've done that, have a look around Camp Nedooae and get an idea of the exciting places you'll be visiting. Explore and learn where the grocery stores, showers and toilets are located. Have a look in to your Subcamp headquarters and get to know the folks who will be helping you all week. Check out the Services Centre and see what's happening there. St. Andrew's Plaza will be open at noon, so be sure to check that out.

MEDICAL INFORMATION

All patrol Scouters are responsible to make sure that medical information provided to the Jamboree is complete and up-to-date. It is a good practice to travel with a copy of each patrol member's medical information, and have this with you at the Jamboree also.

International Units should also ensure that you have appropriate travel insurance including medical coverage, and adequate funds (or access to these) to cope with any medical attention that may be required while in Canada.

YOUTH PROTECTION

In the event a report needs to be made concerning youth protection, the report can be made to the Children's Aid Society of Halifax (902-425-5420). If the child is in immediate danger, call the Police at 911

Everyone who has information, whether or not it is confidential or privileged, indicating that a child is in need of protective services is required to report that information. Reports may be made anonymously.

CODE OF CONDUCT AND SCREENING

Scouts Canada's National Policy on Child and Youth Safety requires that all adults registering for CJ'17 must be registered members of Scouts Canada and have fully completed the volunteer screening process. This includes a Police Record Check/Vulnerable Sector Screening that is valid at the time of the Jamboree. Screening also applies to adults registering from outside of Canada.

Drug and Smoking Policy

There shall be no illegal drug or substance consumed or made available on any Scout Property, owned or leased.

There shall be no illegal drug or substance consumed or made available during any Youth Program activity including Jamborees or similar events. There shall be no alcohol at any Youth Program activity including Jamborees or similar events.

There shall be no alcohol consumed or made available where minors are present. Scouts Canada reserves the right to apply appropriate disciplinary measures if members are found to be in violation of these policies.

Smoking

In accordance with Scouts Canada's Code of Conduct, no Scouts Canada member is to smoke in front of youth members. Designated smoking areas will be established. Unless otherwise indicated by signs designating Smoking Areas, all areas of the Jamboree are strictly non-smoking.

REFERENCE RESOURCE

Pick up a copy of Field Book for Canadian Scouting from your Scout Shop for tips and advice on setting up your kitchen and campsite.

PATROL ORGANIZATION

There is no single best way to create Patrols, but they should be formed by the Scouts themselves. You may, however, offer plenty of help by supporting how the Scouts go about forming Patrols (while not dictating what Scouts should be in what Patrols), and you can provide some important guidance about the chemistry that should make for good Patrols—and a good Troop.

Once Patrols are selected, Scouters should encourage them to work closely together as teams. The members will grow closer to one another over time. Planning, Doing and Reviewing Adventures together will strengthen the Patrols and make Scouting a more rewarding experience for the members of the Troop.

LIFE THREATENING ALLERGIES

If you have an allergy that requires the use of an epi-pen or similar device, it is essential that you keep it with you at all times in a readily accessible waist pouch. Bring a second epi-pen for a back-up and give it to your fellow Patrol Scouter. Make sure your epi-pens will not expire during the Jamboree and are functional. Adults should

have their second epi-pen in their gear as backup, with a second Patrol Scouter being aware of the location. Please ensure your need to use an epi-pen is listed on your medical forms.

LOCATING PATROL MEMBERS

It is the Patrol Scouters responsibility to know where members of the patrol are at all times. We recommend you set up a buddy system so that your patrol members and enforce the expectation everyone always knows the location of their assigned buddy.

PROTECT YOURSELF

Please review the information in the "Protect Yourself" document.

PROGRAM NOTES

At least two Scouters are required to attend each Program Activity with the scouts.

Supervision of your Patrol during program activity periods is the responsibility of your Patrol Scouter, while Program Staff conduct individual activities. Scouters are responsible for ensuring that Patrol members are capable of participating in the activities they have chosen.

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During water activities, other than supervised swimming, Personal Floatation Devices (PFDs) are required to be worn, regardless of swimming ability.

INDABA

First introduced in Canada at the 6th Canadian Jamboree, Indaba was established as a forum to enhance Scouter and OOS learning about programs and planning, and enable Scouters to adapt and implement these ideas in back home programs and events. Since then, Indaba has become an integral part of not only Canadian Jamborees, but also World, Provincial, and Regional scout gatherings.

An Indaba is actually a gathering of African native tribes, but Baden-Powell adapted the word to mean a gathering or conference of Scouters. At CJ17 there will be a series of workshops and activities for any Patrol Scouters and Offers of Service attending the Jamboree. The Indaba program will operate as workshop sessions held every evening, with a choice of sessions offered taking no more than 90 minutes a session.

SAFETY TALK - TICKS

WHAT ARE TICKS

Ticks are tiny bugs that live off the blood of mammals and birds. They are typically found throughout North America in grassy wooded areas or along shorelines and in parks.

FOR MORE INFORMATION

HOW TO PREVENT TICKS BITES

Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts. Use a repellent with DEET on skin. Repellents containing 20% or more DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide) can protect up to several hours. Always follow product instructions. Avoiding the hands, eyes, and mouth.

AFTER YOU GET BACK TO YOUR CAMP SITE

Check your clothing for ticks.

Have a Shower, and

Check your body for ticks after being outdoors. Conduct a full body check upon return to your tent. Check these parts of your body for ticks:

- under the arms
- In and around the ears
- Inside belly button
- Back of the knees
- In and around the hair
- Between the legs
- Around the waist

SAFETY AROUND TICKS

- If the tick is attached to the person's skin, remove it immediately:
- Wearing gloves, grasp the tick with clean tweezers as close to the skin as possible to remove the head and mouthparts.
- Pull the tick straight out gently and steadily. Do not twist.
- Do not try to remove tick with a hot match or petroleum jelly. This could cause the tick to regurgitate infected fluids into the wound
- Save the tick in a container and report to the camp clinic.



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Cleanse and Protect the Area

- Wash hands and clean the bite area with warm water and gentle soap.
- Apply alcohol to the bite wound to prevent infection.

See a Health Care Provider

- Report to the clinic immediately if the tick has burrowed into skin or if the head, mouthparts, or other tick remains cannot be removed.

After the Jamboree

See your family doctor if:

- You develop flu-like symptoms, fever, headache, nausea, vomiting, muscle aches, or a rash within one month after the bite. Take the tick to the health care provider's office or the hospital if possible.
- The bite area develops a lesion within 30 days.
- There are signs of infection such as redness, warmth, or inflammation.
- You think it might be a deer tick. Your doctor may prescribe a single dose of an antibiotic to help prevent Lyme disease.
